1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Brazil is in the active campaign phase ahead of the October 2026 general election. The contest is being conducted in an information environment shaped by durable political polarisation, recurring claims about the integrity of the electronic voting system, and allegations of foreign involvement in domestic political disputes. The same period has seen continued expansion of military participation in public-security tasks across Latin America, a structural trend that outlasts any single election.

UPDATE, 3 SEPTEMBER 2026: Reuters reporting dated 3 September 2026 describes an intensifying campaign in which polling, candidate positioning, and interference allegations are all contested. Sentinel Meridian treats specific poll numbers as attributable to the publishing institute and survey period rather than as a settled measure of national opinion, and treats interference allegations as claims attributable to the party, official, or institution making them. Where reporting cites official investigations, the existence of the investigation is the verified fact, not its conclusion.

The operative risk for clients is not the identity of the winner. It is the concentration of contestation into the period between the first round, any run-off, and certification, when legal challenges, mobilisation, and platform-level information operations peak simultaneously. Sentinel Meridian assesses elevated but manageable disruption risk concentrated in major urban centres and around federal institutions in Brasília.

2. KEY JUDGMENTS

1. The campaign is highly polarised and the information environment is contested; narrative disputes over electoral-system integrity are recurring rather than novel.
2. Polling should be read as a range across institutes and dates, not as a point estimate; individual surveys are attributed to their publisher and field period.
3. Foreign-influence allegations are politically salient and are being advanced by multiple actors; they are treated as claims pending competent-authority findings.
4. Electoral institutions retain operational capacity, and the technical conduct of the vote is not assessed to be the primary risk.
5. The highest-risk window runs from the first round through certification, when legal challenge, street mobilisation, and online amplification coincide.
6. Urban disruption risk concentrates in Sao Paulo, Rio de Janeiro, and Brasília, particularly around federal buildings, electoral courts, and party headquarters.
7. Military involvement in public security continues to expand regionally; in Brazil this raises civil-military and legitimacy questions that persist beyond the election.
8. Post-election policy uncertainty affects energy, environmental enforcement, trade alignment, and security cooperation more than day-to-day commercial operations.
9. Platform moderation decisions and judicial orders against online accounts will remain a flashpoint in the campaign's final weeks.

4. SEPTEMBER 2026 CAMPAIGN UPDATE

CAMPAIGN PERIOD

- **MAY 2026**
Baseline assessment published; polarisation and system-integrity narratives identified as principal risks.
- **3 SEPTEMBER 2026**
Reuters reporting describes an intensifying campaign with contested polling and interference allegations advanced by competing political actors.
- **OCTOBER 2026**
First round, possible run-off, and certification; the concentrated risk window for mobilisation and legal challenge.

Attribution standard applied in this update

- Polling is cited by institute and field period, and read as a range across surveys rather than a single number.
- Interference allegations are labelled as claims of the party, official, or institution advancing them.
- Where an investigation exists, the existence of the investigation is the verified fact; its outcome is not assumed.
- Platform enforcement and judicial orders are recorded as documented actions without inferring intent.

5. REGIONAL SECURITY MILITARIZATION

Across Latin America, armed forces continue to take on policing, border, and infrastructure-protection roles. The trend is

driven by organised-crime pressure and constrained police capacity rather than by the Brazilian election, but it interacts with the campaign by making security posture a partisan issue.

- Military deployment normalises exceptional security measures and complicates later withdrawal.
- Civil-military boundaries become contested when deployments coincide with electoral periods.
- Commercial operators face more checkpoints, more discretionary inspection, and less predictable movement during deployment periods.

6. INDICATORS AND WARNINGS

7. IMPLICATIONS FOR CLIENTS

- Plan for movement disruption in Sao Paulo, Rio de Janeiro, and Brasilia during the first round, any run-off, and certification.
- Instruct staff to avoid demonstrations, federal institutions, and party facilities during peak periods rather than relying on ad-hoc judgement.
- Maintain a source-attribution standard in internal reporting; the campaign's information environment rewards unverified circulation.
- Defer non-essential policy-dependent decisions in energy, environment, and trade until post-certification clarity.
- Review continuity arrangements for logistics through urban corridors during the election window.

8. INTELLIGENCE GAPS

- Polling accuracy across institutes in a polarised environment is unresolved.

- The evidentiary basis for competing interference allegations is not public.
- The scale of coordinated online activity is only partially observable.
- Post-election coalition composition and policy direction cannot be forecast reliably.
- The durability of expanded military security roles after the election is unknown.

9. SOURCES AND METHODOLOGY

This assessment draws on wire reporting, public institutional statements, and regional security trend analysis. The September 2026 update reflects Reuters reporting dated 3 September 2026. Confidence is Moderate-High for the risk structure and Low-Moderate for outcome prediction.
